# Wreningham VC Primary School PE Premium 2018/2019

### Participation, Achievement, Competition and The School Games:

Wreningham consistently provides opportunities for more children and teams to compete in the school games than any school in Norfolk, regularly taking up to 3 teams to events where other schools — many much larger — will only take one team. This has been recognised by the Sports Partnership (South Norfolk), and is highlighted by our Gold School Games Mark.

We attempt to enter the whole range of sports offered by the School Games, providing children with new opportunities and experience of competitive competition, regardless of current ability/gender. Consequently, there is a high expectation and a consistent improvement in skill and achievement. As such, our progress is now consistently highlighted, not only by the enthusiasm and enjoyment of sport by our children, but also by the results achieved by the children in competition.
